The Book of Job Suffering and Sovereignty Syllabus

Course Description

The Book of Job is a book about human suffering and divine sovereignty. Paradoxically it is a book about grace and a refutation of simplistic cause and effect explanations of human suffering.

Course Objectives

After completing this course the student will:

- 1. Remember the basic content and message of the Book of Job.
- 2. Identify the major themes in Job.
- 3. Know the major problem passages and their possible solutions.
- 4. Gain a greater appreciation of Job's contribution to our understanding of human suffering and divine sovereignty.
- 5. Grow in spiritual maturity by developing the right perspective of human suffering and divine sovereignty.

Course Textbooks

- 1. The Bible
- 2. Class notes

Note: The student will be responsible for reading the Bible passage that will be discussed that day before each class and also any assigned class notes or handouts.

Course Assignment Description

1. Read the entire Book of Job at least once during the length of the course. There is no substitute for reading the Scriptures!

2. Keep a notebook (preferably a 3-ring binder) devoted *specifically* to the Book of Job. The notebook should contain the course handouts, your notes, and any assignments that you do for this course. Organizing these materials now will make them accessible in the future as you continue your studies and as you may have opportunity to teach the book.
